What Does It Take **To Be WasteWise?**

* Commit to reducing waste.

Most WasteWise partners join the program for a 3-year period. To accommodate federal facilities working on EO 13101 directives, WasteWise designed a flexible 5-year goal implementation period. As a first step, EPA encourages partners to conduct a waste audit on their operating and purchasing practices to identify cost-effective opportunities for waste reduction.

* Establish waste reduction goals.

Within the first 6 months of membership, partners identify practical and measurable goals tailored to their specific needs. Partners set goals to: prevent waste, start or expand internal recycling collection efforts, and buy/manufacture recycled-content products. Again, the goals you choose are up to you.

* Track progress.

Partners monitor their progress and annually update EPA on their accomplishments. WasteWise partners benefit from knowing how much they reduce and save and often use this information to communicate results to employees, managers, and the public.

In 1998, the United States Postal Service Northeast Area reported saving \$76,000 by eliminating more than 1,000 tons of undeliverable bulk mail by working with its mailers on improved addressing and mail list management. The Northeast Area also saved \$2.3 million by recycling nearly 41,500 tons of paper, 106 tons of plastic, nearly 1,000 tons of metal, and 1,650 tons of wood

Demonstrate Environmental Leadership

Waste Prevention Tips

Based on results achieved by WasteWise partners, waste prevention activities that federal agencies might consider include:

- Reduce paper usage through duplex copying and printing, e-mail, posting and routing memos, record imaging, and posting documents on Web sites.
- Eliminate landscape waste by mulching, shredding, and composting vard trimmings, leaves, and branches,
- * Promote the reuse of office furniture and equipment through central redistribution, remanufacturing, and donation programs.
- Encourage the use of reusable dishware in kitchens and offices, and reduce cafeteria waste by replacing disposable plates, flatware, and cups with reusable or compostable dishware and mugs.
- * Save and reuse shipping boxes and packaging peanuts for outgoing packages.
- * Work with suppliers to deliver products in reusable containers.
- * Create green teams to design and promote waste prevention activities
