Three Clues for Consumers That Your **Clothing is**





You can ask your retailers questions about where and how the garments are made. Garment workers are required to be paid at least the minimum wage and overtime.



You can ask your retailers whether they independently monitor garment manufacturers to avoid buying from sweatshops. Many retailers have voluntarily agreed to conduct site visits of suppliers to monitor working conditions



You can ask your retailers whether they support "No Sweat" clothing. Commitments from retailers to avoid buying sweatshop-made clothing can go a long way toward eradicating sweatshops in America.
